2022 RECIPIENT William "Cooper" Hastings '01

H aving grown up on a boarding school campus, Cooper knows the value of connections. When he was a student at Pomfret, he participated in soccer, hockey, squash, and lacrosse.

Following four years on the Hilltop, Cooper attended St. Lawrence University, graduating with a BA in history. After a short time in sales, Cooper realized his passion was education and helping students. He earned his MSW from Wheelock College and has been working with young adults ever since. He credits his four-year advisor, Waddy Rowe, and faculty members Bobby Fisher and Dolph Clinton '92 for helping him discover his career path as a licensed social worker. In 2016, Cooper returned to Pomfret and spent three years on the faculty.

After leaving his role as a school counselor at Pomfret, Cooper immediately volunteered to serve as a class agent. He has worked diligently to keep his classmates connected to each other and the School. In his first two years as a class agent, he helped his class increase their participation from 28 percent to 41 percent. Currently, the Class of 2001 is on the path to reaching all-time high participation numbers.

Cooper lives in West Hartford with his wife Emily, daughter Greer, and son Lawson. He helps individuals experiencing anxiety, depression, and academic underachievement through Talkspace, an online and mobile therapy company.

2022 RECIPIENT Chelsea Cutler '15

Chelsea Cutler's active involvement in Pomfret School life set the stage for her future success. She was a member of the GriffTones a cappella group, a co-host of the WBVC radio station, and a Key Head for admissions. She also began producing electronic music while at Pomfret. She was a member of the lacrosse, ice hockey, and varsity soccer teams, and, in the fall of 2013, was named to the WWNEPSSA All-Star soccer team. Following graduation, Chelsea went to Amherst College but left during her junior year to pursue a successful music career.

Chelsea established herself as a quiet, yet disruptive, force for popular music as a singer, songwriter, and producer. Within three short years, she went from bedroom-constructed SoundCloud uploads to more than two billion cumulative streams. In 2017, her breakthrough single "Your Shirt" paved the way for her debut EP, *Snow In October*. Leaving college, she hit the road alongside Quinn XCII before kicking off a prolific string of releases, leading to two completely sold-out nationwide headline tours.

After signing to Republic Records at the beginning of 2019, she released the joint EP *brent* with Jeremy Zucker. She spent the next few months playing festivals and formulating her solo debut album, *How To Be Human*. Released in January 2020, the record peaked at No. 23 on the Billboard 200 chart. She saw her debut on the Top 40 radio charts with the project's lead single, "Sad Tonight," and supported the album with another sold-out nationwide tour.

During the pandemic, Chelsea created *brent ii*, a follow-up joint EP, and her sophomore album, *When I Close My Eyes*. The latter was released in October 2021 to critical acclaim. In December 2021, Chelsea was named to *Forbes*' 30 Under 30 in music. After a successful tour this spring, Chelsea is currently performing at music festivals, including the Governors Ball and Lollapalooza.

2022 INDUCTEE James C. Goodale '51

Jim Goodale immersed himself in the life of Pomfret School by becoming a standout citizen and athlete. He played four varsity sports at Pomfret — football, basketball, hockey, and baseball. He led the football team in rushing, the baseball team in batting, and was tied for top scorer in hockey — a sport he had never played before. In his senior year, Jim was a member of the Athletic Council, vice president of the Athletic Association, and the recipient of the Pomfret Bowl.

Following Pomfret, Jim attended Yale University, where he was a starter on the varsity hockey and baseball teams. After college, he joined the St. Nick's hockey team, which at the time played US college teams, and he was active in competitive tennis and squash. In 2015, Jim was a recipient of the George H.W. Bush '48 Lifetime of Leadership Award, given to outstanding Yale athletes for the example of leadership they set since graduation.

Jim is the former general counsel and vice chairman for the New York Times and led the defense in the 1971 Supreme Court "Pentagon Papers" case. A leading First Amendment lawyer, he has been called the "father" of the Reporters' Privilege that protects reporters from disclosing their sources. In 1974, *Time* magazine named him as one of the USA's 200 future leaders, along with Joe Biden.

Jim currently resides in New York City with his wife, Toni. He skated regularly until he was 85 years old, when his doctor told him to stop, complaining that he was an "athletic nut," which Jim freely admits he is.

He was previously honored by the AAEC in 1997 with the Pomfret School Alumni Award for his success in his profession and dedication to the School.



2022 INDUCTEE 2009-2010 Girls Basketball Team

s NEPSAC Class B champions, the 2009-2010 Agirls varsity basketball team went undefeated 28-0. They beat out Class A champions - effectively crowning them the best team in New England. Coached by Rebecca Brooks and Ryan Jordan, this team was known for its exceptional sportsmanship, true team playing, and leadership. They were made great by the whole rather than by any one individual. Though there may have been teams with as much talent in Pomfret's history, as one former faculty member said, "There has not been a team as cohesive or dominant." This team was also known for pulling the community together, as large percentages of the student body turned up to see them compete in - and ultimately win - many close contests. Off the court, many of the athletes dominated in other sports that same year, including as a nearly undefeated girls soccer team and in a spectacular softball season.

2022 RECIPIENT The Honorable Eric D. Coleman '69

The Honorable Eric D. Coleman has dedicated his life and career to service and making a difference in the lives of others. He has led the effort to repeal the death penalty in the state of Connecticut, enact Connecticut's medical marijuana program, and implement gun safety legislation. He was the legislative force behind the so-called "Second Chance Society" proposal — aimed at reducing the prison population and providing support for inmates re-entering society — and was the champion of a comprehensive bill to address the excessive use of force by police in the state.


While a student at Pomfret, Eric was a founding member of the Afro-Latin Society and was a member of the basketball, baseball, and track and field teams. Following graduation from Pomfret, Eric earned his BA from Columbia University and his JD from the University of Connecticut School of Law. Prior to opening his own law practice, he worked in legal aid and served as a public defender. He was elected to the Connecticut House of Representatives in 1982 and then to the Connecticut State Senator in 1994. While a senator, he served on several committees, making history in 2001 when he was appointed to serve as Chair of the Judiciary Committee — the first African-American to hold that position. In May 2018, he was appointed as a Connecticut Superior Court Judge. He is currently assigned to the Waterbury Judicial District, where he presides over family matters.

He has given his time to the School to volunteer with Admissions, Advancement, and various student groups. Eric served as a member of the Board of Trustees from 1984 to 1988 and currently serves on the School's Alumni Association Executive Council. Most recently, Eric was on campus in May as the Commencement speaker for the Class of 2022.

Eric resides in Bloomfield with his wife, Pamela. The Colemans have three adult children, three grandsons, and eight foster children.

WILLIAM BEACH OLMSTED DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

In 1991, the Alumni Association of Pomfret School established the William Beach Olmsted Distinguished Service Award. The award was created to recognize and honor distinguished, sustained, and dedicated service to Pomfret School. It is named in honor of the Reverend William Beach Olmsted, who served as headmaster for thirty-two years until his death in 1929.



2022 RECIPIENT Adolphus "Dolph" Clinton '92

Dolph Clinton's service to Pomfret School spans over three decades, beginning as a student, then a faculty member, and most recently as a class agent and volunteer. During his four years as a student. Dolph served as the head of the Social Committee, a prefect, a Key tour guide, and a member of both VOICE and the community service team. Following graduation from Pomfret, he went on to Gettysburg College, where he was a student leader in multiple roles and became the school's first freshman resident assistant.

After college, Dolph spent three years at Kenyon College in the Admissions Office, only to be lured back to Pomfret by then Head of School Brad Hastings '68. For nearly two decades, Dolph served Pomfret in many ways, including as a college counselor, co-director of multicultural affairs, admissions officer, dean of students, teacher, coach, form dean, dorm parent, and — his favorite role — advisor. He was recently named associate head of school at Cheshire Academy.

In 2014, Dolph earned his master's in education for school leadership from the University of Pennsylvania. Utilizing his enhanced skill and education in leadership, Dolph created Pomfret's first student leadership training workshop, which helped train rising student leaders. The theme of the inaugural year was "Leave It Better Than You Found It." Dolph is also one of the original architects of the QUEST program, the cornerstone of Pomfret's student life curriculum.

Dolph remains active in the alumni community. He currently serves as a class agent for the Class of 1992 and is — for the fourth time — a member of his class reunion committee.
